IMPACT

Winchelsea staff have benefitted from working alongside the Speech and Language Therapists (SALT) which continues to support our communication friendly approach in developing new strategies and ways to increase pupils' confidence and explore new ways and communication devices that could be used with pupils both in school and in the wider community.

SALT have also been working with parents to support the school in the strategies that is used in school at home.

IMPACT

Interventions have demonstrated positive impact in pupils' areas of need. Where appropriate, the therapist(s) have liaised with the parents/carers of pupils to enable approaches beneficial to the pupils to be used in the home environment to support further developments. Whole school approach to Occupational Therapy (OT) has helped pupils develop core stability and work on upper body strength and get pupils ready to learn which is having a noticeable difference on the writing data that has come from progress meetings and book scrutiny.

IMPACT

All schools closed nationally on March 23rd due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Focus of support then changed to ensuring the welfare and wellbeing of our whole school community but in particular our key worker and vulnerable families.

All teachers were in regular contact with their classes through pastoral and welfare calls. Logs were kept and school safeguarding protocols were followed.

Home Learning was provided for all children - this was a combination of active learning, access to online resources.

Where families were unable to access learning remotely, packs were provided either for collection or delivery. Personalised resources were also available to meet specific PPG children's individual needs.

IMPACT

Precise 'Narrowing the Gap' Intervention timetables for Maths and English are developed by teaching staff to make effective use of TAs in addressing identified learning needs and gaps in understanding. Outcomes are reviewed during regular teacher meetings and progress is monitored by SLT. Teachers are aware of gaps in attainment and barriers to learning for individual pupils and work with the curriculum leads in English and Maths to put interventions in place both 1:1 and in the classroom so that the intervention can continue to have an impact on progress data and pupil planned targets (PPTs).

Clear outcomes are identified for individuals who are in receipt of a Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) and additional provision and enrichment opportunities

are created and then assessed at the end of the opportunity to see if it has had an impact. This is recorded on the pupil's impact report and on the engagement scales in progress data.

Rigorous monitoring of impact is undertaken through the use of progress data against PPG and non PPG pupils and on a pupil's impact report completed by the class teacher of interventions TA.

IMPACT

PPG pupil's specific needs are linked to strategic and focused literacy intervention programmes and differentiated activities both in class and 1:1. Improved confidence and self-belief in the areas of literacy and barriers to learning are removed.

Reading and writing levels improve of targeted pupils which can be seen in book scrutiny and progress meeting data.

IMPACT

The impact of our music intervention is also measured in the uptake of additional music 1:1 teaching. Half termly reporting and tracking of standards across the curriculum for PPG/non PPG student and photo and video evidence of the pupil's practical learning. Pupil's impact report is completed by the music teacher.
